UNDER OAKS



About Under Oaks

The Under Oaks Garden is designed to showcase an opportunity for homeowners to use native plants underneath their oak trees, not only to bring color and dimension to their yard but to also support essential pollinators and other wildlife.

Oak trees are a keystone species, meaning they exert a large and critical stabilizing influence throughout an ecological community, despite its relatively small population. There are 21 oak trees native to California and they provide tremendous benefits for homeowners and the environment. By mimicking the natural structure of a forest, you can choose from a diverse selection of adapted natives to plant underneath your oak. By adding native plants underneath, you can provide a safe haven and food source for fallen caterpillars while they complete their lifecycle. If you don't already have a

stunning oak in your yard, there are many benefits to having one including shade, shelter, increased property value, food, fuel, and more! So, plant an oak tree and accessorize with our shade tolerant, oak adapted natives!

Maintenance

- Don't disturb roots. Keep the area from the trunk to the edge of the canopy (the root zone) as
 natural as possible. Avoid heavy foot traffic, parked cars, trenching, construction, or anything that
 compacts the soil or raises the grade. This includes solid hardscape surfaces. Choose gravel or
 other permeable surfaces instead.
- Don't remove dropped leaves: which support microorganisms that help protect oaks from
 disease as well as many butterflies find shelter in the leaf litter, either in egg, pupal, or adult form,
 to safely wait out the winter and emerge in the spring. Leaf litter provides food and shelter to an
 amazing variety of invertebrates who break down the leaves, which feeds the soil and other
 wildlife.
- **Don't irrigate near the base of Oaks.** Oaks want it wet in winter and dry in summer. Oak bark is not adapted to summer moisture, and wet summer roots are prime candidates for deadly diseases.

Prune deciduous oaks when dormant in winter.

Shade-loving (or merely shade-tolerant) perennials are the best types of plants to grow under oak trees.

Oak companions must thrive in partial sun to full shade without robbing key nutrients from the soil. If you're looking to plant shrubs or ground covers under your oak tree, it's best to choose plants that thrive in the shade without stealing all the water and nutrients from the soil. Should be planted 10 feet or as far away from trunk as possible.
